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






SIMON SMITHERS

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




SIMON SMITHERS Director

Simon J. Smithers showed an early interest in theatre watching his mother perform Gilbert and Sullivan with a local Operatic Company. After a varied and active association with the amateur stage Simon went on to train professionally at the Guildford School of Acting. His professional debut came shortly after at the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre in Ray Cooney's "Two Into One" which premiered with the author. Simon considers himself a character actor and his many roles include: Bamforth; " The Long and the Short and the Tall", Captain Corcoran; "H.M.S. Pinafore", Hastings; "Richard III", Will Parker; "Oklahoma", Sir Hugh Devon; "Bitter Sweet" Captain Hook; "Peter Pan", Danny; "Night must fall" commended by Emlyn Williams himself.

Moving to theatre management, Simon retired from his position four years ago to concentrate upon Directing. Since 1991 Simon has directed: "Aladdin", Oklahoma", "Carousel", "The Boyfriend", "Anything goes". Simon is delighted to be directing for Nairobi City Players for the first time, and looks forward to a continued relationship later this year, and indeed in the years to come.

Upon his return to the U.K. in July, Simon begins work on "Iolauthe", "Move over Mrs Markham" and an original works to be premiered in November 1997 working closely with the author. Whilst here Simon has been invited to play Gary in "Noises Off" at the Professional Centre with Phoenix Players in April, which he hopes you will enjoy as much as this, his first project with NCP.

My best wishes to all of you tonight.



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JOHN B. KEANE

John B. Keane, one of Ireland's most prolific writers was born in Listowel, County Kerry on 21 July, 1928. He has written several full-length plays which include MANY YOUNG MEN OF TWENTY, SHARON'S GRAVE, BIG MAGGIE, THE YEAR OF THE HIKER, THE CHASTITUTE, SIVE, THE FIELD and THE MAN FROM CLARE. He has also written five books of essays, two of short stories and eight books of his best-selling LETTERS, adapted for RTE in the series TALES OF KILNAVARNA. The Abbey productions include HUT FORTY TWO (1962), THE FIELD (1980/1987), THE MAN FROM CLARE (1963/1984) AND SIVE (1985/1986), His first novel THE BODHRAN MAKERS, an Irish best-seller, was published by Vanguard Press, New York in the spring of 1988. In 1987 he received a Special Awad for his enduring place in Irish life and letters from the Sunday Independent/Irish Life Arts Awards as well as the Sunday Tribune Arts Award for Literature. More recently he has been chosen as the recipient of the Irish American Fund Award for Literature 1988.

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
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MARGARET CURRAN "Maggie Polpin" Margaret Curran was born in Waterford, Ireland and is a speech and Drama teacher. She graduated from the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art (LAMDA) and the Leinster School of Music and Drama, Dublin and also studied under James Dodding, a Producer / Director of Drama at the BBC.

Involved in theatre in Ireland for over 20 years, Margaret was a member of a number of Drama Groups in Waterford and Dublin and acted in a multitude of plays including " The Glass Menagerie ", " Kennedy 's Children ", " The Factory Girls ", " Lovers ", and John B Keane's " The Field ". This will be her second time to play " Big Maggie " as she also played the part in Dublin in 1990.

In 1992, she was the sole narrator of several ancient Irish fables including the stories of Cuchullain, Setanta et al, on a set of six children's audio tapes which were marketed and sold throughout Ireland that year.

Arriving in Kenya almost 3 years ago, she quickly got involved in theatre and was first seen on stage as "Kate " in " Dancing at Lughnasa ", the first NCP production of an Irish play. Nairobi audiences will also have seen her more recently with the Phoenix Players in "Black Comedy" and "The Bed Before Yesterday".

A committee member of NCP, Margaret was Assistant Director for NCP's most recent panto "Little Red Riding Hood". This maybe the last time audiences will see Margaret on stage in Nairobi as she is due to return to Ireland later this year.

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MARIA CUNNINGHAM "Katie Polpin"

Maria arrived in Nairobi on 13 February 1987, from Sligo, in the North-West of Ireland. Three months later she appeared in her first performance with Nairobi City Players - "Old Time Music Hall" where she displayed her tap dancing ability and introduced Irish dancing to audiences in Mombasa, Nakuru, Eldoret and around Nairobi.

Following her performances as a member of the chorus in the musical "How to Succeed in Business without Really Trying" and in the pantomine "Dick Whittington" she proceeded to play her first speaking part as "Dorothy" in "Stepping Out", and rattled the floor boards in the tap dancing numbers. Her most recent appearance with NCP was as "Chris" in "Dancing at Lughnasa" in which she choreographed the Irish dance sequence and even danced on the kitchen table! Maria was last seen by Nairobi audiences in the Norfolk Cabaret "When Irish Eyes are Smiling"which was produced by her husband, Gerry.

When she is not performing Maria is kept busy with her three children - Grace (13), Stephen (12) and Clare (7), and the rest of the time she is an Administrative Assistant in UNEP.

Minnie has lived in Kenya all her life. She attended St. Andrews Turi Prep School and then onto St. Michaels Burton Park in England. Professional qualifications (after the ever useful Secretarial course at Marlborough College Oxford) include Gold medals in verse and prose and acting followed by an Acting Diploma from the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art. She is currently teaching Speech and Drama in Nairobi for Drama Development. The age range of her students is five to eighteen-and she loves them all!.

Performances of note so far are "An Ideal Husband", "Oliver", "An Inspector Calls", "Daisy Pulls it Off", "Ali Baba & The Forty Thieves", and "Jack & The Beanstalk".

She has also written and directed a play called "Inconsistency". She was Assistant Director for "A Taste Of Honey". Her hobbies include Scuba Diving & Horse riding.



JOE McDONOUGH "Teddy Heelin:"

Joe joins this NCP production as a complete novice having never trod or trampled the boards previously. This role offers a complete change of pastime, with many challenges never before experienced. Joe is an Army Warrant Officer based here in Kenya with his family. He is currently serving with the British Army Training Liaison staff located here in Nairobi.

Joe's career started at the age of five in musicals as lead tambourine in the kindergarten school production of "Goldilocks". Such was the critics acclaim that he was signed up for school drama productions of Shakespeare and Gilbert and Sullivan - ten years later! After leaving University he tried the London Stage not quite the West End - West Hampstead players in the "Crucible". He did not make that either as he was transferred to Kenya only one week after opening. The stage was foresaken for 'Bush' life until years later, he was persuaded by his wife to join her in the Ruiru Amateur Dramatic Society. There followed a series of revues as actor, director & producer. So much fun was had by all that he returned to amateur acting.

Nairobi audiences have seen him in Phoenix Player's production of "Roar like a Dove" and with the Nairobi City Players in "The Business of Murder", "Twelve Angry Men", "Robinson Crusoe" and "Dancing at Lughnasa".

TRACY VAUGHAN "Mary Madden" Before coming to Kenya Tracy travelled quite widely doing an assortment of different jobs, but now teaches drama in schools around Nairobi, as well as spending time singing with "The Racket" - a rock band which plays around Nairobi, running with the Hash and enjoying Africa.

Tracy's previous performances include "The Rose Tattoo", "Suddenly Last Summer", "Fen", "Winter's Tale" among others at both University and in the London and Bristol fringe. She has also toured the UK and Germany with Children's Theatre Companies.

Here in Kenya, Tracy has taken part in"The Bed Before Yesterday" for Phoenix Players and for Nairobi City Players, this is her first performance.



JENNY DUNNET "Mrs Madden"

Jenny Dunnet comes from a theatrical family in Dorset, England. She has appeared in many productions in the UK, including Principal Girl and Principal Boy in Pantomimes. One of her most successful productions in England was as "Judith Bliss" in Noel Coward's "Hay Fever".

While in Cairo her productions in dinner-theatre included "Billy Liar", "Tomb with a View", "Someone Waiting", "Absurd Person Singular", "The Wizard of Oz" and many revues.

Now back in Nairobi after twenty three years, she has appeared in "Half way up the Tree" for Phoenix Players and "Hedda Gabler", "Fiddler on the Roof", Habeas Corpus", "Cabaret Magic", "Dancing at Lughnasa", A Taste of Honey" and in Pantomimes for Nairobi City Players.



JAN COHEN "Old Woman" Jan Cohen has been involved in theatre all her life, for the last 22 years in productions around the world. Favourite acting roles were Miss Adelaide in "Guys and Dolls", Hecuba in "Trojan Women", Madame Arcati in "Blithe Spirit" and Jessie in "Night Mother". Directing "Tamara" (the play you experience from room to room) was also a high point. If you ask her about it she would be happy to bore you on that subject! A newcomer to Nairobi, Jan has appeared in one other show here - The Phoenix Theatre Production of "84, Charing Cross Road".



FERGUS DIGNAN "Old Man"

Fergus has been living in Nairobi for a number of years and has been involved on the periphery of some past productions. This is his first stage appearance.



ROY LAWERENCE "Priest" From an early age in Manchester, England, Roy took an interest in Theatre assisting back-stage and playing "bit"parts whenever possible. He came to East Africa as a young man where he worked in Kampala, Dar-es-Salaam and finally Nairobi. 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
